Seasons greetings, Oswego!

We are nearing the holiday season with Thanksgiving, Christmas, and the new year right around the corner. We have had a busy few months that have given us here in Oswego a lot to be thankful for and to feel truly blessed to live in our wonderful community! We have exciting activity including both private sector projects and government initiatives.

New construction is underway downtown! We approved public improvements on Block 11 in August, and in September, we held a groundbreaking ceremony with Imperial Investments for a three-story multi-use building. They quickly followed with the announcement of a second project in Block 11, the Dairy Barn. One, and hopefully, both buildings will be open for business in 2020. We also closed on the former Alexander Lumberyard in October and had a groundbreaking ceremony with Shodeen in November.

We know with these new developments we must provide safe passage for our residents and link both sides of Main Street. Our first traffic study for a stoplight at Washington and Main Streets came back favorably and in September we held a pedestrian safety open house to collect public comments.

While the new developments downtown are very exciting, we have been busy on the periphery as well. The Village received a land donation adjacent to the Park N Ride on Orchard Road for an outdoor entertainment venue. We are in the process of collecting community input and will have several future announcements. We also approved final plans for a 7-Eleven now under construction on Route 71 that will open next fall. We have had several businesses open, including two unique restaurants, Pho Son and Asadoras Argentinas, with Home of the Hoagy and Yummy La Michoacana soon to follow.

We have been busy on the government side as well. Our intergovernmental group that kicked off in July had a big win for the taxpayers of Oswego! This winter, the Village will store road salt for School District 308 for a savings of \$187,762. The Village Board recently passed a 4% reduction in water rates and at the same time moved several water related projects forward into this year's budget. The Village board is currently discussing a property rate reduction as well.

Please don't hesitate to reach out to us with your thoughts, concerns, or ideas. Working together, we will keep the future bright in Oswego! I look forward to seeing you and your family at Christmas Walk presented by Allied First Bank on Friday, Dec. 6.

CONSTRUCTION UPDATE



Street closures are limited to areas immediately around construction projects. All businesses and Hudson Crossing Park will remain fully open and accessible throughout construction.

STREET CLOSURES ARE IN EFFECT ON ADAMS, HARRISON, JACKSON STREETS

CONSTRUCTION IS UNDERWAY in downtown Oswego. Street closures are limited to roads that will be completely reconstructed as a part of their neighboring developments. That includes portions of Adams, Harrison, and Jackson Streets.

All businesses in downtown Oswego are open and fully accessible, including Hudson Crossing Park, which can be accessed from the Fox River Trail or the corner of Washington and Harrison Streets. Parking will be available as usual in front of downtown businesses. Grab a coffee or a pint with friends, and on your way in, catch a glance at the progress being made on these exciting new developments.

Construction on both The Reserve at Hudson Crossing and Block 11 is expected to continue throughout the winter, weather permitting.

FREE TROLLEY SERVICE





PREPARE FOR WINTER WITH THESE TIPS

PREPARE YOUR MAILBOX

Village of Oswego snow plow drivers are careful to avoid damaging mailboxes, however, with limited space to pile snow and hundreds of miles of roadway to plow during each snowstorm, drivers cannot avoid pushing snow against mailboxes.

Secure your mailbox now before winter weather strikes and the ground is frozen:

- Check that your mailbox post is straight and that the box is not leaning over the curb.
- Replace damaged or rotting posts.
- Check the connection point between the box and the post to ensure that the box is securely fastened.

If your mailbox is damaged during a snow storm, report it within 3 business days of the snow event by calling Public Works at 630-554-3242, clicking on Report an Issue on www.oswego.org, or by submitting a request through the Oswego Click 'n Fix app available for most smartphones.

A Public Works representative will determine if the damage is caused by a plow blade or vehicle. If so, the Village will reimburse the homeowner up to \$75 for mailbox replacement. If the damage is caused by snow coming off the plow blade, or some other undetermined cause, the Village cannot provide reimbursement. All receipts must be submitted by April 30th, 2020, to be reimbursed. No reimbursements can be made after that date, and all costs will be the responsibility of the homeowner.

ALL ABOUT SNOWPLOWING

SNOW PLOWING CREWS in the Public Works Department work hard to keep you safe during the winter driving season.

In addition to plowing, Public Works crews uses an anti-icing program that includes two different applications of a liquid mixture of salt brine, calcium chloride, and an agricultural product (typically beet juice). Crews custom-blend the mixture for each snowstorm based on projected pavement and air temperatures and wind speeds to efficiently slow roadway icing.

This mixture is applied to roads up to 48 hours before it snows, and can be seen in longitudinal stripes along the pavement. It is applied again directly to the rock salt just prior to distributing the salt onto the roadway. When applied to the rock salt, the liquid mixture helps the rock salt activate and work in colder temperatures, plus reduces how much the salt bounces when it hits the pavement.

The anti-icing system has several benefits. Most importantly, it helps crews remove snow and ice from the pavement faster and at lower temperatures. Second, it reduces the average amount of salt applied during each storm by 15 to 20 percent – that saves money and is good for the environment.

When plowing, crews prioritize collector roads such as Douglas Road and Boulder Hill Pass as these roads provide access for large areas. Crews then address neighborhood streets. The Village contracts with a private service to plow cul-desacs, which are labor intensive.

The State of Illinois plows US Routes 30 and 34, and Illinois Routes 71 and 25. Kendall County plows Orchard Road.

Visibility from within snowplows is limited. Keep a safe distance, and remind children to also keep away from plows, including building snow forts away from streets.



Secure your mailbox before the snow falls to prevent damage by snow plows.



FROZEN WATER PIPES affect a quartermillion families nationwide each winter. This damage is largely preventable.

Before winter hits, disconnect garden hoses and, if possible, use an indoor valve to shut off and drain water from pipes leading to outside faucets. This reduces the chance of freezing in the short span of pipe just inside the house.

When temperatures plummet, a trickle of hot and cold water might be all it takes to keep your pipes from freezing. Let warm water drip overnight, preferably from a faucet on an outside wall, and keep your thermostat set at the same temperature both day and night.

Before you leave town, set the thermostat in your house no lower than 55°F. Ask a friend or neighbor to check your house daily to make sure it's warm enough to prevent freezing. And if you'll be gone long, shut off and drain the water system.

If your pipes freeze, never try to thaw a pipe with a torch or other open flame because it could cause a fire hazard. Water damage is preferable to burning down your house!

If your water pipes have already burst, turn off the water at the main shutoff valve in the house.

NOTRASH COLLECTION

Groot Industries will not pick up residential trash on Wednesday, December 25th in observance of Christmas Day and Wednesday, January 1st in observance of New Year's Day. Trash and recycling pickup will be delayed by one day during those weeks.

THRU JAN. 10

FREE CHRISTMAS TREE COLLECTION

Groot will collect Christmas trees after the holidays through Friday, Jan. 10. Place your bare tree, free from lights, ornaments, tinsel, or any decorations by the curb on your normal scheduled garbage day. Do not bag your tree or place a yard waste sticker on it. After the second week in January, residents will be required to wait until April when the yard waste program starts up again, and a sticker will be required at that time.

NO PARKING ON SNOW-COVERED STREETS

Parking is prohibited on Village streets when two inches (2") or more snow has accumulated. Keeping cars off the streets helps Village crews clear the roads faster and prevents your car from being plowed in. Vehicles parked on the streets during in snowy conditions are also more likely to be struck by other vehicles. Street parking is allowed again once the snow stops and the streets have been plowed curb to curb.





SHOVEL SIDEWALKS, HYDRANTS AND DRIVEWAYS THIS WINTER

Although plow drivers take care to selectively place snow, sometimes snow must be placed at intersections and heaped on parkways.

Help keep yourself and your neighbors safe by shoveling curb ramps and digging out fire hydrants so they can be accessed quickly in a fire.

When clearing snow, do not deposit snow onto the roadway. Shoveling, plowing, or blowing snow into public streets causes driving hazards and is prohibited by Village ordinance. Keep garbage cans and recycling totes out of the street so the plows do not hit them.

FROM THE VILLAGE ARBORIST

PROTECT TREES AND SHRUBS FROM WINTER FREEZES

TREES NEED a little extra care in the winter months, too. Exceptionally cold winter temperatures can damage or kill typically hardy trees and shrubs, as evidenced by yellowed boxwoods killed by last winter's polar vortex.

Here are some easy things that you can do to prepare your trees and shrubs for the upcoming winter season:

- Place mulch 3-4" deep around trees and shrubs to conserve soil moisture and insulate roots from cold temperatures.
- Protect evergreens and delicate shrubs from wind and salt spray with burlap. Drive wooden stakes into the ground around the shrub. Then, wrap


burlap around the stakes and staple the burlap the stakes.

- Use a ring of chicken wire with stakes around small saplings and shrubs to protect them against rabbits.
- Carefully remove heavy snow from the branches
 of hardwood trees before it freezes to the limb to
 reduce the chance of limbs breaking. Removing
 ice that is encased on branches can cause
 additional damage, so it is best to let the ice melt
 off naturally.

These simple tips can help to ensure that your landscape will survive the harsh weather that is predicted for Oswego this winter.

FROM THE OSWEGO POLICE DEPARTMENT



On Oct. 5, the Oswego Police Department and Oswego Fire Protection District partnered for a public safety open house. Residents toured the new police headquarters, saw policing demos, and dined over hot dogs with Oswego police officers.

GET YOUR FURNACE AND FIREPLACE READY

DURING THE WINTER your furnace will turn on and off nearly 9,000 times. To keep your heating system running safely and efficiently, call a qualified contractor and schedule a check-up for your furnace. You can also take these steps:

- Check your flame. Flames should be mostly blue and steady. A pale yellow or wavy flame could be a sign your furnace is not working properly.
- Check your venting system. Soft, rusted or broken vent piping can lead to carbon monoxide poisoning.
- Be sure your furnace or boiler is free of dust, rust and any other signs of corrosion.
- Check air filters regularly. Clean or replace them as needed.
- Make sure that furnace panels and grills are in place and that the fan compartment door is closed when the furnace is on. Leaving those doors open could cause carbon monoxide to build up in living areas.

Cozy up around the fireplace this winter, but first:

• Clean your chimney once a year.

- Clear away any debris, such as bird nests at the top of the chimney.
- Check the chimney flue for blockages.
- Spark arresters should be installed on wood burning fireplaces. If you already have spark arresters, be sure they have been installed correctly.
- Be sure all dampers are operational and open and close properly.
- Keep the screen closed at all times when using the fireplace.
- Keep the area in front of the fireplace clear of all flammable materials, including paper, wood, or furniture.
- Never use charcoal lighter fluid or similar liquids to start a fire in the fireplace. These are extremely flammable and quickly become dangerous.
- Fireplaces should be Underwriters Laboratory (UL) approved.

WINTER DRIVING TIPS

GET A CAR CHECKUP

Have your car inspected ahead of the cold weather. Here are some items that should be inspected. Check for:

The battery and charging system

Clean air and oil filters

A working heater and defroster

Tire tread and pressure (including the spare)

Excessive wear on belts and hoses

Windshield wipers and washer fluid levels

Working lights

Cooling system fluid for winter tempera-

tures

Leaks in the exhaust system

CARRY EMERGENCY GEAR

Equip your vehicle with the following:

Ice scraper

Brush or broom

Windshield washer fluid

Shovel

Flashlight

Warning signs

Flares

First aid kit

Warm blankets and extra clothing

DRIVING SAFELY

Allow extra time. Trips can take longer, especially on icy roads.

Keep your gas tank full in case you are delayed or rerouted during a bad storm.

Keep windshield and windows clear. Use your window scraper, car defroster and a clean cloth to keep the windows free of fog.

Slow down. Snow and ice make stopping distances much longer, so leave more distance between your vehicle and the vehicle ahead. Bridge decks and shady spots can be icy when other areas are not. Avoid sudden stops and quick direction changes, and watch for flashing lights on other vehicles.



Breaking ground on a new downtown Oswego

THIS FALL construction began in earnest on two major developments that will transform downtown Oswego. On Sept. 11, Yorkville-based Imperial Investments broke ground on a three-story building that will feature office space and a first-floor farm-to-table restaurant. The building, on the former Village Hall site on Main Street, will anchor a reimagined Block 11, which will be completely reconstructed to accomodate more restaurants.

On Nov. 5, Shodeen broke ground on the first phase of The Reserve at Hudson Crossing, the two-building, six-story development of luxury apartments, retail, restaurants and free public parking decks. Watch for anouncements of exciting new openings by the end of 2020.

The next time you log in to pay your water bill, you will be prompted to create an account with the Village's new bill pay system.

THE VILLAGE OF OSWEGO is

changing to a new, user-friendly utility billing citizen self service (CSS) system for utility bills issued on or after Friday, Nov. 15, 2019. The new system will allow you to pay your bill, view your bill, sign up for automatic bill pay via a checking account or credit card, view your payment and consumption history, sign up for e-bills and much more.

As of Nov. 15, 2019, you will no longer be able to pay your bill through the Village's current online bill pay site. You will be redirected to register and pay at the new CSS site.

What you need to know about direct debit and credit payments

If you are already using direct debit autopay through your checking account, you do **NOT** need to take any action. Your payment will continue to be deducted on the due date.

If you are currently a credit card autopay customer, the Nov. 15 bill cannot be automatically charged to your credit card. You **DO** need to register and pay with the credit card that you would like to authorize for payment at the new CSS site at www. oswegoil.org on or after Nov. 15.

Get your bill electronically

If you would like to receive your bill by email, you must register and sign up for e-bills at the new CSS site.

You can still pay by mail, drop box or

As always payments may also be mailed to Village of Oswego, PO Box 5450, Carol Stream, IL 60197-5450, dropped off in our payment drop box in front of Village Hall, sent electronically through your bank, or paid at the utility billing counter inside of Village Hall.

MORE WAYS TO PAY!

MANUALLY PAY EACH BILLING CYCLE

Access the new citizen self service (CSS) system at www. oswegoil.org and manually pay your utility bill each billing cycle. You will need your account number and customer ID#, which are both displayed on your bill, to initially set up your online account.

SET UP DIRECT DEBIT FROM YOUR CHECKING ACCOUNT

Set up direct debit automatic payments (DD AUTO PAY) to have your utility bill payment automatically deducted each billing cycle from an authorized checking account. To set up DD AUTO PAY, you will need to have your account number and customer ID# as well as your bank account information.

Note: If you are already using direct debit autopay through your checking account, you do not need to enroll in this option again. Your bill payments will continue to be automatically withdrawn on the bill due date from the checking account you have previously authorized.

SET UP CREDIT CARD AUTOMATIC PAYMENTS

Set up credit card automatic payments (CC AUTO PAY) to have your utility bill payment automatically charged each billing cycle to an authorized credit card. Visa, Mastercard and Discover are accepted.

Note: If you are already using credit card automatic payments, you **MUST** register at the new CSS site. The Nov. 15 bill cannot be automatically charged to your credit card. To set up credit card autopay, you will need your account number and customer ID# as well as your credit card information. Your first credit card payment must be done manually. Subsequent payments will then be automatically charged on the due date. You are responsible for updating all credit card information on your account at the CSS site.

PAY BY E-CHECK

Online payments by check will now be accepted. You will need to have your **account number and** customer ID# as well as your bank information.

PROPERTY OF THE SEASON



TRAVEL SOUTH on Main Street from downtown and you'll discover a timeline represented in the homes that line the street. Each property, from an 1850s stone blacksmith shop at Main and Tyler Streets to a 1900s classical revival estate at Main and Judson Streets, marks a period and a set of ideals about home ownership. Each has a lineage of owners that trace back to earlier periods in Oswego history, but some also connect Oswego to broader ideals. The home at 444 S. Main Street is a good example.


Built around 1950, this ranch home, with its large windows protected under horizontal roof planes, may seem overly familiar today, but the origin of its style is anything but ordinary. Even for the 1950s.

The home exhibits characteristics of the Usonian home, envisioned and promoted by architect Frank Lloyd Wright, as an alternative to centralized, urban living. Single-story, compact, with a distinctly horizontal emphasis in its roofline, the home represented a lifestyle that Wright promoted

through the publication of three books beginning in 1932; Disappearing City, When Democracy Builds, and The Living City. The Usonian ideal embodied his holistic proposal called Broadacre City that continued to increase in awareness with the publication of his third book in the 1950s.

Wright linked his vision to egalitarian principles: good design for all, use of natural materials, and land ownership. He promoted technology in the home like radiant floor heating and capitalized on the growth of auto culture and communication technologies as a means to free people from urban alternatives. He envisioned a particular version of what many of us recognize today as suburbia.

The form and materials of 444 S. Main Street draw from that same vision. The home is the product of Naperville builder Donald A. Tosi who designed similar homes throughout the region before his passing in 2009. Most notably, Mr. Tosi collaborated with Wright protégé Bruce Goff on the Sam & Ruth Van Sickle Ford home in Aurora.
