A POLICE HQ FOR THE FUTURE OF OSWEGO

When the Oswego Police Department moved into its headquarters on Route 34 back in 1991, the facility was designed for a staff of just 50 people, in a town of just 4,400 residents. Now, 27 years later, and with a staff of 70, Oswego Police are getting ready for the move to a roomier HQ. Step inside the new Oswego Police Department headquarters on Wooley Road, a station built not just for more space, but for a forward-thinking, collaborative police force.

CURRENTLY, WHEN an Oswego police officer needs extra firearms practice, just getting to the range can take hours of an officer's time. It requires packing up gear and driving out west to an outdoor range with limited daylight hours.

"It's a big drain on time, when we'd rather have them out on patrol," said Deputy Police Chief James Jensen.

But when it's complete this October, the new Oswego Police headquarters will include a

dedicated training center with an emergency operations center and classroom, a fully padded defensive tactics training room, and a six-lane, 25-yard shooting range.

The new space will allow first responders from Oswego and other agencies to get more training in less time and in a variety of adverse conditions. Already, OPD is working with the neighboring Oswego Fire Protection District to plan an active shooter training that would get paramedics into mass shootings sooner.

"That shaves minutes off their response and can save lives," Jensen said.

These are the kind of efficient operations and collaborative opportunities the new headquarters was designed to create.

"We gave a lot of thought to flow and process," said Police Chief Jeff Burgner. "How can we move our patrol officers through the station most efficiently so that they spend less time getting

squads set up and grabbing gear and more time out working in the community?"

Instead of cramped spaces where officers bump into each other, the new 70,000 square-foot headquarters will have spaces for the specialized functions of a modern force, including records storage, jailing and evidence processing using current best practice standards in law enforcement. A new lab will speed up tasks like fingerprint testing, which currently must be sent out and can take more than a year just to determine the viability of samples.

The new station also offers a community room for both the police and outside community groups to use, building policing relationships that prevent crime before it happens. Other spaces throughout the facility will be dedicated to organizations like the Kendall Co. Health Department, which will offer satellite services and offer links to services like mental health and addiction treatment.

The new facility is forward-thinking in its environmental footprint, too. It will be LEED Certified Silver, and topped with its hallmark solar tower, which houses a south-facing solar tube thermal system that will provide radiant floor heating in the lobby and reduce energy costs.

A public ribbon-cutting is scheduled for 3 p.m. on Friday, Oct. 26, with tours continuing through the evening. Check out **www.oswegopoliceil.org** for more details.

LEAF COLLECTION

ZONES

The Village has a zoned collection system to provide residents with a set schedule for leaf collection. Your house is assigned a zone based upon its location in the Village:

Zone A All properties west of the Fox River, Hunt Club subdivision, and all properties east of Fox Bend Golf Course and south of Route 34.

Zone B All properties south of Wolf Road, all properties south of Route 34 east of the Fox River and west of Route 71 (the downtown area), all properties south of Route 71 excluding Hunt Club subdivision.

Zone C East of the Fox River and northwest of Route 34.

DATES

Village crews will collect leaves three times this season. Leaf collection is scheduled for Monday through Friday as follows:

Zone A Weeks of October 15, October 29 & November 19

Zone B Weeks of October 15, November 5 & November 26

Zone C Weeks of October 22, November 12 & December 3

Dates may be subject to change due to Inclement weather, staffing, potential equipment issues, and the volume of leaves.

FREE CURBSIDE LEAF COLLECTION

EACH FALL, the curbside leaf vacuum program provides Oswego residents a way to dispose of leaves at no additional cost.

To have you leaves collected, rake them into piles placed in the parkway, on the grass between the sidewalk and curb, by 7 a.m. on the Monday of your specified collection week.

No brush, grass clippings, tree limbs, vines, or trash will be collected. These materials can cause damage to our costly equipment and can put the operator and residents in the area at risk of injury or death.

Please remember

 Leaves placed in the parkway after 7 a.m. will be picked up on the following scheduled week for your zone.


- Due to the tremendous scope of this work, leaves piled near an obstruction or obstructed by a parked vehicle will be skipped, and will not be picked up until the next collection week.
- The bulk of the piles will be vacuumed up as the crews go by your address. However, it is impossible for crews to collect 100 percent of the leaves piled for collection.
- Keep leaves out of the curb line and street. Leaves in the street can cause hazardous driving conditions and local flooding.
- Leaf burning is prohibited at all times throughout the Village.

There is a very small window of opportunity to collect the leaves from the time the leaves fall to when winter weather begins. Inclement weather or large volume of leaves can alter the leaf pickup schedule. Once the leaves are snow covered, the vacuum cannot collect the leaves and the program may be suspended.

Collection alternatives

Residents are strongly encouraged to use alternative options such as placing leaves in and around plant beds under trees and shrubs as this provide nutrients for the soil and provide insulation for the plants.

Residents can also use Groot's curbside yard waste bags and refuse collection program. The final day for yard waste pickup through Groot is Friday, November 30th.

WATER MAIN FLUSHING

The Public Works Department will be flushing water mains between October 15th and October 26th, weather permitting.

Crews will begin flushing at 7 a.m. Signs will be displayed to alert residents of the upcoming flushing and will be placed throughout the Village the week before the flushing.

To avoid possible rust discoloration, finish your laundry before 7 a.m. or after 6 p.m. on these days. If your laundry does become discolored, notify the Public Works Department at 630-554-3242.

The Public Works Department flushes fire hydrants in the spring and fall under the recommendation of the Illinois FPA

Flushing cleans the water mains by running high flows of water through fire hydrants to get rid of iron deposits that could produce colored water and, in some instances, plugged water



meters. Flushing also helps produce fresh water by opening hydrants at the end of water mains and pulling fresh water all the way to the end of the line.

Run cold water first

Before running your hot water, run all cold water taps first to make sure the water is running clear. Once you are sure it is running clear, it is alright to run your hot water.

FREE FALL CLEAN-UP

Groot Industries will collect additional household waste, vard waste and bulk items for all Village residents the week of November 5-9, on your regularly scheduled garbage day for free.

Place all items at the curb by 6 a.m. along with your regular garbage and recycling on your normally scheduled garbage day.

Residents must place yard waste in 30-gallon kraft yard waste bags. Do not place yard waste in plastic

Stickers will not be required for this week only.

Residents cannot put out appliances, televisions, or electronics during this collection. Call Groot at 877-775-1200 to schedule a special pickup for these items.

NO TRASH COLLECTION

Groot Industries will not pick up residential trash on Monday, September 3, in observance of Labor Day and Thursday, November 22, in observance of Thanksgiving. Trash and recycling pickup will be delayed by one day during those weeks.



OSWEGO REMAINS COMMITTED TO 100% CLEAN ELECTRICITY

In July, the Oswego Village Board renewed its commitment to 100 percent renewable energy for residents in the Village, making good on the Village's mission to respect our environment, while also remaining fiscally responsible. Learn more about your options and how renewable energy works in our electrical grid.

Where does my electricity come from? Oswego residents pay ComEd to *deliver* electricity. However, Oswego's new energy *supplier* is MC Squared, which will supply renewable energy at the same rate as ComEd's nonrenewable energy. As always, residents will get their electricity bill through ComEd.

What kind of power will I be using? MC Squared will generate wind power, and then put that power into the ComEd grid. ComEd cannot route specific power directly to your home. When wind energy is put into the grid, it is essentially "mixed" with other sources of energy like coal and nuclear. However, by contracting with MC Squared for a 100 percent green energy contract, the Village of Oswego is supporting local wind energy producers, guaranteed by using a system called Renewable Energy Credits.

When you turn on a light, that light will be powered by a combination of wind, coal, nuclear and other sources. Although the dollars you spend on your ComEd bill each month will pay renewable energy producers, it is still environmentally friendly to reduce energy use, especially during peak times.

Will I be paying more for green energy that I would for fossil fuels? No. Village staff did comparison shopping and negotiated with electricity suppliers. Our supplier, MC Squared, agreed to supply green energy and price match the rate that ComEd would have charged for supplying non-renewable energy. Oswego residents will pay the same price, but will be supporting the development of non-polluting renewable energy.

Can I opt out? Yes. Residents can sign up to use ComEd or any other energy supplier at any time without a penalty.

Who do I call if I have a problem? As always, billing and the electrical system will be handled by ComEd. If you have an issue with your bill, experience an outage, or discover a downed wire or other safety issue, call ComEd at 800-334-7661.

Will someone come to my home to sign me up for clean energy? No. You do not need to do anything to be signed up for clean energy. If someone calls or visits your home claiming to be the Village's energy supplier, you can report them to the Illinois Commerce Commission at www.icc.illinois.gov/consumer/complaint.

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GET A NEW PARKWAY TREE FOR HALF THE COST

Do you have a dead tree in your parkway? Contact the Public Works Department to report dead parkway trees so they can be inspected and removed. Then ask for a replacement through the Village's 50/50 Tree Replacement Program.

For half of the wholesale cost of a tree, you can select the species you'd like from an approved list, and the Village will take care of the planting and stump removal. Call Public Works at (630) 554-3242 to sign up.

BRUSH COLLECTION

The Village of Oswego has two brush collection zones for residential properties. Zone A includes all properties east of the Fox River and north of Route 34 as well as those properties west of the Fox River and north of Mill Road. Zone B includes all properties east of the Fox River and south of Route 34 as well as those properties west of the Fox River and south of Mill Road. The final brush collection weeks of the year are:

Zone A September 4 October 1

Zone B September 10 October 8

Brush is defined as tree and bush branches that are less than 5" in diameter. The brush collection program is not intended to handle branches, logs, or tree stumps from large-scale tree trimming or removal. Crews will not pick up logs, wood, root balls, cuttings, or grass clippings.

Place unbundled brush parallel or perpendicular to the street in neat bundles with all cut ends facing the same direction. Do not put brush in a container or in the street. Crews will place an orange tag on your door indicating the reason they did not pick up the brush if it is the wrong material or placed at the curb prior to the deadline.

Place all brush at the curb by 7 a.m. on Monday morning of the designated week but no earlier than noon the Friday before. The Public Works trucks will pass through an area once and will not return for brush placed after the deadline.

The Village does not accept landscaping waste generated by contractors. Crews will not remove brush from commercial, industrial, or other non-residential properties.

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RESPITE DAY PROGRAM OFFERS A NEW **OPTION FOR SENIORS WITH MEMORY LOSS**

Specifically designed to create a safe space for those with memory loss, the new Lighthouse Day Respite Program is just one of the many programs at the Oswego Senior Center that is improving the quality of life of Oswego's senior residents and their caretakers.



LIGHTHOUSE DAY Respite program at the Oswego Senior Center is a new social model program for participants experiencing mild to moderate memory loss, but who can interact, use the restroom, and eat without physical assistance. Participants engage with their peers, get social interaction, explore interests and improve their quality of life, all while caregivers get an opportunity for respite.

By hosting the Lighthouse program within the Oswego Senior Center, OSC staff can maintain a safe and secure space, while also partnering with Senior Center volunteers and class participants for a more enriching experience that promotes compassion for

those with memory loss.

Lighthouse is offered 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. Monday through Thursday. Participants must be aged 60 or older to participate in this private pay program. The cost is \$40 a day.

A typical day includes group discusions, lunch, art, exercise, games and music, and supported engagement with ceramics, tai chi, woodworking and other OSC activities.

There is a \$40 fee to apply, and participants will need to go through an intake process.


