### **Law of Interest**

#### **Village Of Oswego Ordinance Curfew**

It shall be unlawful for any person under the age of eighteen (18) years to be present at or upon any public assembly, building, place, street or highway at the following times unless accompanied and supervised by a parent, legal guardian, or other responsible companion at least eighteen (18) years of age approved by a parent or legal guardian or unless engaged in a business or occupation which the laws of this state authorize a person less than eighteen (18) years of age to perform:

- (A) Between one minute after twelve o'clock (12:01) A.M. and six o'clock (6:00) A.M. Saturday;
- (B) Between one minute after twelve o'clock (12:01) A.M. and six o'clock (6:00) A.M. Sunday; and
- (C) Between eleven o'clock (11:00) P.M. on Sunday to Thursday, inclusive, and six o'clock (6:00) A.M. on the following day.

Any person under the age of eighteen (18) years who shall violate this chapter shall be subject to a penalty as in this code provided.

It is unlawful for a parent, legal guardian or other person to knowingly permit a person in his or her custody or control to violate the provisions of this chapter. Violators shall be subject to a penalty as in this code provided.

No minor child shall be guilty of this offense if involved in, going to or coming from an activity involving the exercise of the child's rights protected under the first amendment to the United States constitution or article 1, sections 2, 4 and 5 of the constitution of the state of Illinois, or both.

Before taking any enforcement action under this section, a police officer shall ask the apparent offender's age and reason for being in the public place. The officer shall not issue a citation or make an arrest under this section unless the officer reasonably believes that an offense has occurred and that, based on any response and other circumstances, no defense under this section is present. #### Smart Trailer Log for 2010

During the month of May, the S.M.A.R.T. Trailers were utilized during the Wine on the Fox Event. The trailers were placed in the downtown area and used as a tool to notify motorists of the increased pedestrian traffic in the area.

Both of our trailers were used during the Prairie Soccerfest Event. During this weekend event, our new trailer was placed on Plainfield Road and programmed with a traffic control message to direct motorists to the main parking entrance. The other trailer was placed along southbound Rt. 71 near the main parking exit.

The trailers were also deployed to six different locations throughout the Village. These locations were selected in an effort to educate the motoring public of the posted speed limit for each roadway. No speed studies were conducted at these locations.

Based on repeated speeding complaints by residents living on Hoover Drive and Prairieview Drive, 24 hour speed studies were completed for each respective roadway. The results of the studies are included in this report.

#### **FINDINGS**

After receiving periodic complaints regarding speeding on Hoover Drive, a 24 hour speed study was completed. The study reflected a total of 545 vehicles traveled on Hoover Drive (340 eastbound and 205 westbound). The average speed within the 85<sup>th</sup> percentile was 22 mph for eastbound traffic and 23 mph for westbound traffic. The posted speed limit on Hoover Drive is 25 mph. There were four recordings between 41 and 52 mph. Based on the short length of the roadway, it is unknown whether these are true recordings; however, the HOA liaison officer assigned to the subdivision has been provided the results of the study and will perform periodic patrols of the area. Although there have been several complaints of speeding during the last few years, the study shows there is not a speed related problem on Hoover Drive.

Similar to Hoover Drive, during the last few years we have received periodic complaints regarding speeding on Prairieview Drive. As a result, a 24 hour study was completed on Prairieview Drive. During the study, the traffic tubes only recorded one direction of travel. The study reflected 717 vehicles traveled on Prairieview Drive. The average speed within the 85<sup>th</sup> percentile was 31 mph. The posted speed limit on Prairieview Drive is 30 mph. There was one reading of 74 mph; however, other than that one recording (possibly a ghost reading), one car was recorded traveling between 45 – 49 mph, two were between 40 – 44 mph, 23 (3%) were between 35 – 39 mph and 119 (17%) were between 30 – 34 mph. All other vehicles (80%) traveling on Prairieview Drive were recorded below 29 mph. The study supports there is not a speed related problem on Prairieview Drive. Because we continue to receive complaints about speeding on Prairieview Drive, the HOA liaison officer was informed of the study and the history of complaints. The HOA officer was encouraged to provide periodic speed patrols along Prairieview Drive.

### **Community Concerns**

#### **SATURATION & SPECIAL ENFORCMENT DETAILS**

In May there were three saturation patrols completed by members of the Traffic Enforcement Unit. Additionally, Traffic Unit members completed a total of 22 directed patrols.

Again in May, Traffic Officers each picked two subdivisions for their directed patrol assignments. The HOA liaison officers assigned to the subdivisions selected by Traffic Officers were informed of the additional enforcement efforts planned for their subdivision. This enforcement approach is intended to supplement liaison officer's traffic efforts within their assigned subdivision.

Traffic Officers completed directed patrols in the following subdivisions; Ashcroft, Brookside, Churchill, Fox Chase North, Lakeview Estates, Ogden Falls.

#### **IMaGE GRANT RESULTS**

In May, our department participated in the Illinois Department of Transportation IMaGE Grant. The focus of this campaign was on seatbelt enforcement. Using specific seatbelt enforcement zones, officers worked both day and night hours to identify seatbelt violations. Below are the results of their efforts.

#### CITIZEN ASSISTED RADAR MONITORING PROGRAM

Alumni from our Citizen Police Academy completed two radar monitoring details. During these two hour details, they monitored the areas of N. Adams Street, Heritage Drive, Prairieview Drive, Lombardy Lane and Minkler Road. These locations were selected as a means to determine whether additional speed enforcement is necessary and to support ongoing efforts in this subdivision.

As a result of these details, nine courtesy letters (3 N. Adams & 6 Heritage Drive) were mailed to motorists exceeding the posted speed limit by 8 or more mph. The radar monitoring program continues to be a useful tool in supporting our enforcement efforts.

#### MISCELLANEOUS ENFORCEMENT & EDUCATIONAL EFFORTS

In preparation for the Memorial Day Holiday, we partnered with the Oswego East High School, Oswego High School, Oswego Community Bank, Oswego Ace Hardware, The Knights of Columbus and Marcley's Mini Mart to provide driver safety messages on their respective marquees. The messages included, "Seat Belts Save Lives, Buckle Up", "Slow Down – Arrive Alive", "Look Twice Save a Life" and "Click It or Ticket". These educational efforts helped support our enforcement efforts during the holiday.

To support our department's seatbelt enforcement efforts, a "Click It or Ticket" banner was placed along Rt. 71 just north of the intersection with Washington Street. The banner acted as an educational reminder for motorists traveling along Rt. 71.

In May, the Oswego Police Department provided a safety message in each resident's Village Water Bill which read, "Oswego Police Reminder, Buckle Up, You're Worth It!"

Members from the Traffic Unit acted as instructors for the teen driver safety program, Operation Impact, which is provided to all Oswego District 308 Drivers Education students. During the presentation, officers discuss crash statistics as it relates to young drivers, the main contributing causes of crashes, the top 5 contributing factors for fatal crashes, several guidelines regarding the Illinois Graduated Drivers Licensing Program, the dynamics of a traffic stop and what drivers should do if they stopped by the police. This was the completion of the program's second full year. Approximately 1,200 students have attended the program.

Officer Lawrence earned the 1,000 Speed Enforcement Award. Since October 1, 2006, Officer Lawrence has issued 1,008 speed tickets. The Speed Enforcement Award is sponsored by the Illinois Department of Transportation.

While working an IMaGE Grant seatbelt enforcement detail on May 22<sup>nd</sup>, Officers Canon & Wicyk and Detective Dickey met the criteria for "Looking Beyond The Safety Belt." After identifying a passenger in violation of the state's seatbelt statute, the officers continued to use their investigative skills to identify occupants in the vehicle as offenders in a crime that occurred in our Village earlier that week. They also found the occupants of the vehicle had just committed a similar crime in an adjacent town. As a result of their efforts, the occupants of the vehicle have felony charges pending in Oswego and face additional charges in two other towns.
