F.1. Kendall County Health Department Presentation

Dr. Amaal Tokars, Executive Director for the Kendall County Health Department, addressed the Board regarding addiction and opioid praxis.

National Trends on Drug Death and Mental Health Relevance to Addiction

US Drug Death Data

- Approximately 64,000 drug overdose deaths occurred, across the United States.
- This represents an almost 21% increase of drug overdose from the prior year.
- > Approximately 66% of overdose deaths involved prescription and/or illicit opioids.
- This represents an almost 28% increase of opioid overdose from the prior year.

Mental Health Matters

- ➤ Data show that persons diagnosed with mood or anxiety disorders are about twice as likely to suffer also from a drug use disorder.
- > Similarly, persons diagnosed with drug disorders are roughly twice as likely to suffer also from mood and anxiety disorders.

Overdose death rates vary widely by State; from 6.3 per 100,000 in North Dakota to 35.5 per 100,000 in West Virginia.

Illinois Death Trends & Relevance of Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACES)

• Illinois Drug Death Data

- > Over 2000 drug-induced deaths
- ➤ Over 44% increase in three years

- > Over 80% of drug deaths were opioid related
- > Over 70% increase in three years
- Adverse childhood experiences are strongly related to the prevalence of a wide range of health problems throughout a person's lifespan, including those associated with substance misuse:
 - Emotional Abuse Emotional Neglect Household Incarceration Household Mental Illness
 Household Substance Abuse Household Violence Parental Separation Physical Abuse Physical Neglect Sexual Abuse

ACES can have lasting effects on:

- Health
- Behaviors
- Life potential

Local 2017 Drug Death Data


- ➤ 302 Kendall County Deaths

- > 5% of Kendall Deaths are Drug-Induced
- ➤ 24 Accidental Kendall Deaths
- ➤ 13 Accidental Drug Deaths
- ➤ 54% of Accidental Deaths are Drug-Induced



Praxis- from reflection to action.

Board and staff discussion focused on number of deaths have increased since 2014; number one addiction three years ago was alcohol; mean age of opioid deaths in Kendall County is 43; Illinois ranks 22nd; surprised to see marijuana as the 2017 local trend; whether marijuana is causing the increase in deaths; not as dangerous as opioid; prevention; whether there is progress in the school district; whether the health department has reached out to the school board; they will be reaching out to them. There was no further discussion.
