

NATIONAL RECOGNITION

The Downtown Oswego Historic District (DOHD) has been officially listed in the National Register of Historic Places. The DOHD includes properties along Main Street between Jackson and Washington street.

Buildings in the district include the former Oswego Fire Station 11 and the former Oswego Post Office, as well as other historic institutional and commercial properties. The district's period of significance ranges from 1845 to 1972 with many of the structures constructed with architectural styles from the mid-19th century, late Victorian, and late 19th and 20th century revivals.

The listing of these properties in the Register not only recognizes its rich historical significance, but also extends additional benefits to property owners. Inclusion on the register does not limit a property owner from doing interior or exterior modifications.

HELL'S BBQ



WINTER PREPARATION TIPS



Secure your mailbox before snowfall to prevent damage by snowplows.

PREPARE YOUR **MAILBOX**

Village of Oswego snowplow drivers are careful to avoid damaging mailboxes, however, with limited space to pile snow and hundreds of miles of roadway to plow during each snowstorm, drivers cannot avoid pushing snow against mailboxes.

Secure your mailbox now before winter weather strikes and the ground is frozen:

- Check that your mailbox post is straight and that the box is not leaning over the
- Replace damaged or rotting posts before the ground freezes.
- Inspect the connection point between the box and post to ensure that the mailbox is securely fastened.

If your mailbox is damaged during a snow storm, report it within 3 business days of the snow event. Email info@oswegoil.org, call Public Works at 630-554-3242, or click on "Report an Issue" on www.oswegoil.org.

A Public Works representative will determine if the damage is caused by a plow blade or vehicle. If so, the Village will reimburse the homeowner up to \$100 for mailbox replacement. If the damage is caused by snow coming off the plow blade, or another undetermined cause, the Village cannot provide reimbursement. All receipts must be submitted by April 28, 2023 for reimbursement.

HELP OUR SNOW PLOWS CLEAR YOUR STREETS

SNOWPLOW CREWS in the Public Works Department work hard to keep you safe during the winter driving season. You can pitch in on the effort to keep the streets clear—and save yourself some headaches—by taking a few steps around vour home:

Clear the area around your mailbox. This helps prevent damage to your mailbox and the hassle of getting a replacement. (See left.)

Clear snow from the parkways on either side of your driveway's apron. This lets our plows unload their snow before crossing your driveway, so extra slush doesn't block in vour cars.

Pile your driveway snow in your yard. Remember, shoveling or blowing snow into the street is prohibited by Village ordinance.

When plowing, crews prioritize collector roads such as Douglas Road and Boulder Hill Pass since these roads provide access for large areas. Crews then address neighborhood streets. The Village contracts with a private service to plow cul-de-sacs, which are labor intensive.

The State of Illinois plows US Routes 30 and 34, and Illinois Routes 71 and 25. Kendall County plows Orchard Road.

Visibility from snowplows is limited both for pedestrians and drivers. Keep a safe distance and remind children to stay away from plows.





Although plow drivers take care to selectively place snow, sometimes snow must be placed at intersections and heaped on parkways.

Help keep yourself and your neighbors safe by shoveling curb ramps and digging out fire hydrants so they can be accessed quickly in a fire.

When clearing snow, do not deposit snow onto the roadway. Shoveling, plowing, or blowing snow into public streets causes driving hazards and is prohibited by Village ordinance. Keep garbage cans and recycling totes out of the street so the plows do not hit them.



FROZEN WATER PIPES flood the homes of a quarter-million families nationwide each winter. This damage is largely preventable.

Before winter hits, disconnect garden hoses and, if possible, use an indoor valve to shut off and drain water from pipes leading to outside faucets. This reduces the chance of freezing in the short span of pipe just inside the house.

When temperatures plummet, a trickle of hot and cold water might be all it takes to keep your pipes from freezing. Let warm water drip overnight, preferably from a faucet on an outside wall, and keep your thermostat set at the same temperature both day and night.

Before you leave town, set the thermostat in your house no lower than 55°F. Ask a friend or neighbor to check your house daily to make sure it's warm enough to prevent freezing. If you plan on being gone for a longer period of time, shut off and drain the water system.

If your pipes freeze, never try to thaw a pipe with a torch or other open flame because it causes a fire hazard. Water damage is preferable to burning down your house!

Take time to locate your main water shutoff valve before you experience an emergency. If your water pipes burst, turn off the water at the main shutoff valve and call a plumber for assistance.

WASTE COLLECTION

FREE DECEMBER YARD WASTE COLLECTION

During the week of December 5, you may put out yard waste bags without stickers. All yard waste must be placed in 30-gallon Kraft yard waste bags. This new collection was added when the Village renegotiated the waste contract with Groot Industries earlier this year.

HOLIDAY SCHEDULE

Groot Industries will not collect residential trash on Monday Dec. 26 in observance of Christmas Day, and Monday, Jan. 2 in observance of New Year's Day. Trash and recycling pickup following the holidays will be delayed by one day.

DISPOSE OF CHRISTMAS TREES THROUGH JAN. 13

Groot will collect Christmas trees after the holidays through Friday, Jan. 13. Place your bare tree, free from lights, ornaments, tinsel, or any decorations by the curb on your normal scheduled garbage day. Do not bag your tree or affix a yard waste sticker.

After the second week in January, residents will be required to wait until April to dispose of their tree when the yard waste program resumes. In April, a sticker must be used.

FROM THE OSWEGO POLICE DEPARTMENT



WINTER DRIVING SAFETY

To help keep residents safe while driving this winter the Police Department has some tips from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration:

- Check the weather before you leave. Assess the road conditions and traffic.
- Always remain vigilant and drive slowly in the winter—it takes longer to slow your vehicle on an icy, wet or snowy surface.
- Allocate extra time for travel during the winter to compensate for driving more slowly. Do not rush or put yourself in a situation where you feel pressured to speed.
- Either drive behind a snow plow or use caution whenever passing them. Never crowd a snow plow, and do not drive next to them other than for passing. Snow plows are slow, make wide turns, frequently stop, overlap lanes and exit the road often.
- Stock your vehicle with supplies to help you drive safely and stay warm in an emergency during the winter, including a snow shovel, broom/ice scraper, sand or kitty litter for stuck vehicles, flashlight, jumper cables and warning devices like flares or emergency markers.
- Keep blankets, warm clothing, cell phone charger, water, food and extra medication doses in cars in case your vehicle breaks down.

If your car breaks down, follow these tips:

- · Stay with your vehicle.
- Keep the interior dome light turned on.
- Don't run your car for long periods in an enclosed space or with the windows up—this is a carbon monoxide hazard.
- If you must keep your vehicle running to stay warm, clear snow away from the exhaust pipe and run the vehicle only as long as needed.



CATALYTIC CONVERTER THEFTS

The Police Department has recently reported an uptick of catalytic converter thefts.

Here are some prevention tips:

- Keep your vehicle parked in your garage whenever possible.
- Park in a well lit area.
- Park in areas with video surveillance.
- · Install an anti-theft device on the converter.
- Etch your VIN number on the converter and/or paint it a bright color.
- Cars that sit higher off the ground like large trucks and SUVs are popular targets.
- Check with your car insurance to see if you're covered for stolen auto parts.

NO PARKING ON SNOW-COVERED STREETS

Parking is prohibited on Village streets when two inches or more snow has accumulated. Keeping cars off the streets helps Village crews clear the roads faster and prevents your car from being plowed in. Street parking can resume once the snow stops and the streets have been plowed curb to curb.
