THE VILLAGE OF OSWEGO has new leadership at the helm. On Tuesday, May 2, Judge John McAdams swore in new Village President Ryan Kauffman and three new trustees – Karin McCarthy Lange, Luis Perez and Andrew Torres. President Kauffman and Trustees McCarthy-Lange and Perez all served previously on the Board. This is Trustee Torres' first role as an elected official.

"Our Village is only as strong as the collective efforts that we put into it. We have challenges ahead, but with the collaboration of our community we can continue to achieve greatness," Village President Ryan Kauffman said following his oath of office. "Together we can make Oswego an even better place to live, work and raise a family."

During his remarks, President Kauffman shared his vision for Oswego as one of growth and prosperity. He emphasized several key areas on which to focus including economic development, infrastructure including the new water source and roads, and the importance of public safety.



Correct (left) and incorrect (right) brush piles for collection. To ensure that your brush is collected, place it neatly at the curb with cut ends all facing the same direction.

FREE BRUSH COLLECTION

THE VILLAGE offers free brush collection throughout the growing season by zone. See the box for brush collection zones.

RESTRICTIONS

Brush is defined as tree and bush branches less than 5 inches in diameter. Crews will not pick up logs, wood, root balls, cuttings or grass clippings as these will clog and possibly damage the machines.

If you place materials out too early, or include unacceptable items, an orange tag will be placed on your door indicating the reason.

COLLECTION GUIDELINES

Place all brush at the curb by 7 a.m. on Monday morning of the designated week, but no earlier than noon the Friday before. Public Works trucks will pass through an area once and will not return for brush placed after the deadline. Place unbundled brush parallel or perpendicular to the street in neat bundles with all cut ends facing the same direction.

Do not put brush in the street, in a container, or pile brush higher than four feet.

BRUSH COLLECTION ZONES

Zone A includes all properties east of the Fox River and north of Route 34, as well as those properties west of the Fox River and north of Mill Road.

Zone B includes all properties east of the Fox River and south of Route 34, as well as those properties west of the Fox River and south of Mill Road.

The Village does not accept landscaping waste, tree branches, or tree removals as a result of contracted work or large-scale tree-trimming or removal. Crews will not remove brush from commercial, industrial or other non-residential properties. For more information visit oswegoil.org/brush.



SAVE WATER AND SPRINKLE SMART

The Village enforces regulations that limit when residents use Village-distributed water for sprinkling/automatic water systems.

Please note the following watering restrictions:

- Even-numbered street addresses may sprinkle on even calendar dates from 4-9 a.m. and 6-9 p.m.
- Odd numbered street addresses may sprinkle on odd calendar dates; 4-9 a.m. and 6-9 p.m.
- All non-addressed properties, including but not limited to subdivision entrances, may water on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays; 6-9 a.m. and 6-9 p.m.

Automatic watering of trees and shrubs with root feeders within the drip line of the tree or shrub follows the same even/odd restrictions.

There are no restrictions when using a hand-held device to water gardens, trees, shrubs or other plants.

Planting sod or grass seed is prohibited in July and August. Property owners or residents who want to continuously water a newly seeded, slit-seeded or sodded area of more than 10 square yards must get a water permit at Village Hall or Public Works. This permit is free; however, violators will be fined.

When filling a swimming pool, use the even/odd schedule. Using fire hydrant water is not permitted. With new pools where filling time may exceed the conservation limits, you must obtain a free permit for continuous water use.

NO TRASH COLLECTION

MEMORIAL DAY, JULY 4 & LABOR DAY

Residential waste and recycling will not be picked up by Groot on Memorial Day, May 29; Independence Day, July 4; and Labor Day, September 4. Collection will be delayed by one day during these holiday weeks.

Lake Michigan water connection work continues

The path to the Village of Oswego's new water connection to Lake Michigan has cleared several hurdles over the past year, keeping the Village's goal of receiving Lake Michigan water in 2027 on target.

An early priority has been securing access to Lake Michigan water.

On May 6, 2022, Governor Pritzker signed PA 102-736, which amends the Water Commission Act of 1985. This amendment gave the legal authority to the DuPage Water Commission to extend water transmission lines to the Village of Oswego, Village of Montgomery and United City of Yorkville. The three communities are committed to working together to resolve their common concern of water sustainability, operating as a consortium known as WaterLink.

The Village is also on course to receive a permit from the Illinois Department of Natural Resources. The IDNR permit is required of any community that wishes to withdraw water from Lake Michigan. Oswego's staff and consultants recently participated in a legal hearing and anticipate the judge will issue the final order this summer. The order then authorizes IDNR to issue the permit for the Village to obtain water.

While early studies have identified

About our water supply

In December 2021, the Village Board began the process of connecting the Village of Oswego to Lake Michigan water through the DuPage Water Commission (DWC).

The decision came after years of analysis that determined the Village's current underground aquifer would not meet the Village's water needs long term and following an extensive evaluation of available water sources. The Board selected DWC based on water quality, sustainability, cost and system reliability among other factors.

a likely route for the WaterLink transmission mains from a connection point in Naperville, the DuPage Water Commission will soon begin more detailed engineering to deliver water to Oswego, Yorkville and Montgomery. The communities entered into an intergovernmental agreement with DWC to fund design engineering.

The Village continues to work on how best to fund the project, which is expected to cost between \$71 million and \$80 million.

Oswego residents approved a real estate transfer tax in 2022, which will fund a portion of the Village's connection. Since its inception, the real estate transfer tax has generated nearly \$500,000 for water infrastructure improvements. As design engineering is completed, and the WaterLink intergovernmental

relationship is established, the Village will continue to get refined costs.

The Village is also actively pursuing federal grants and low-interest loans to reduce the total cost of the project. A primary source will be the federal Water Infrastructure and Innovation Act program, which provides long-term, low-cost assistance for water projects.

The Village will begin the process of evaluating its current rate structure in the coming months. This study will review the Village's current and long-term water infrastructure and operational needs.


2022 Water Quality Report now available online

Police Chief Jeff Burgner announces retirement after 27 years in Oswego

After 27 years of dedicated service to the Village of Oswego, Police Chief Jeff Burgner will retire on June 13.

Burgner was hired as a police officer in 1996, became a detective in 2000, and was promoted to sergeant in 2004. After graduating in 2007 from Northwestern University's Center for Public Safety School of Police Staff and Command, he went on to become police captain. He was appointed Police Chief in 2014 and has since led several initiatives to enhance the Department's role in the community.

Under his leadership, the Department has continued to meet the highest standards of professionalism with its commitment to provide outstanding services, build strong community relationships, and prevent crime. During

Burgner's tenure, the Department has been recognized for excellence in public safety by the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies, Inc. (CALEA) and received its sixth accreditation award in 2021, making it among only five percent of Illinois law enforcement agencies that are accredited by CALEA.

Burgner also oversaw the planning and construction of the Oswego Police Headquarters, which opened in 2018, to meet the needs of a growing community and provide a modernized building better suited for police work. By ensur-



ing Oswego's officers receive the highest level of training, the Department has been able to respond more effectively to the changing expectations of police.

Along with prioritizing staff training, Burgner has implemented a succession plan that has prepared the Department for retirements.

Burgner will be recognized for his service at the June 13 Village Board Meeting.

The Village will begin the process of selecting the next police chief over the coming months.

FROM THE POLICE DEPARTMENT

New numbers link to community resources

The Police Department has a new resource to assist with mental health crisis calls. Established by the Association for Individual Development (AID), local Mobile Crisis Response Teams (MCR-T) can be dispatched to assist law enforcement provide crisis intervention and support through a team of trained mental health professionals.

This new program will allow immediate intervention for those in need and serve as an alternative to hospitalization or police response. An AID representative is onsite one day a week at police headquarters to provide intervention and assessments for residents to access community-based mental health services in a timely manner. If you or someone you know is experiencing a mental health crisis, call 630-966-9393 or Text: 833-AID-TEXT (833-243-8398).

People in crisis may also call the 988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline (formerly known as the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline) for help with suicidal ideation, substance use, mental health crisis and any kind of emotional distress. Available 24/7 with call, text and chat access to trained crisis counselors, people may also use 988 if they are worried about a loved one who may need crisis support. Depending on the need, police may still be dispatched to mental health crisis calls.

For more streamlined access to local services, the new 211 number provides information on health and human services including food, clothing, shelter, housing, support groups, senior services and health care. People can also call 211 to learn about volunteering or donating items and services.

IN BRIEF

VILLAGE BUDGET INCLUDES FUNDS FOR IMPROVEMENTS

The Village passed Fiscal Year 2024 budget at the April 18 Board meeting. The budget includes \$67 million in expenditures and \$61 million in total revenues.

For FY24, \$31 million of expenditures is being put directly back in the community through projects in the Capital Improvement Plan. Funding for capital projects includes more than \$8 million in grant revenue and \$6 million in surplus reserves, in addition to current revenues.

The capital expenditures include \$14.8 million for road improvements including the Wolf's Crossing Road project, and \$8 million for water and sewer improvements including work to prepare for connection to Lake Michigan as a water source.

Public Works Director receives national award

Jennifer Hughes recognized as Top Ten Public Works Leader

The Village of Oswego Public Works Director and Village Engineer Jennifer Hughes recently earned a national award as a Top Ten Public Works Leader from the American Public Works Association (APWA). The prestigious award recognizes career service to the public works profession, as well as her work ethic and dedication to service in the community and APWA.



Hughes has worked for the Village for nearly 10 years planning and managing infrastructure projects, overseeing the Village's wells and water mains, and providing essential services including waste collection and road maintenance. She leads a team of 27 that is dedicated to plowing roads in winter snowstorms, removing downed tree branches after severe weather, and filling potholes in the heat of summer.

"Jennifer is truly deserving of this award," Village President Ryan Kauffman said. "As a growing community, Oswego must balance maintenance of its current infrastructure, ongoing growth and keeping an eye to the future. Jennifer has done that through her entire time with the Village, ensuring we can meet the needs of future generations of Oswegoans."

Some highlights of Hughes' work in Oswego include leading the creation a master plan for widening Wolfs Crossing and overseeing the start of the project, managing a multi-year plan to bring Lake Michigan water to the Village, and overseeing

downtown improvements. Hughes has also been instrumental in securing significant grant funding for the Village, including \$8 million for Wolfs Crossing. In addition, her role in helping to build the new police headquarters in 2018 helped earn a national APWA award.

Hughes graduated from the University of Notre Dame, previously worked for the Indiana Department of Transportation leading highway design projects. Hughes also worked for the Village of Lincolnshire, eventually named the community's the first female Public Works Director.

She continues to serve as a role model and mentor to others in the industry. She has been active in APWA, including serving as Chapter President in 2016.

"I couldn't have received this award without having an incredible team surrounding me at every step," said Hughes. "We've accomplished so much together to make Oswego and our world healthier, safer, and prosperous, and hopefully happier."

Hughes was recognized at the May 16 Village Board meeting for winning the national award and was commended for her service and commitment to the Village.
