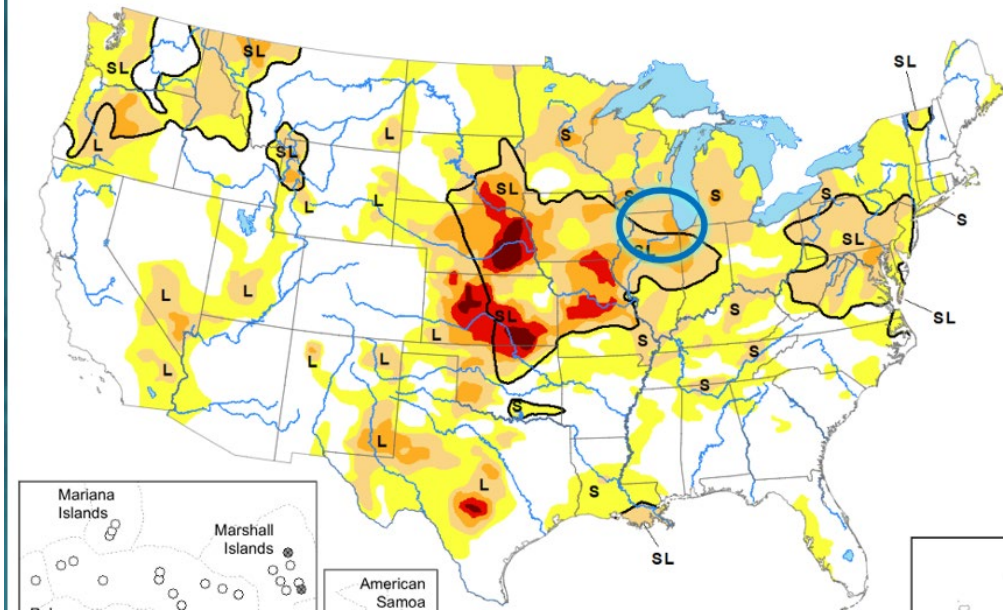
STAFF REPORTS

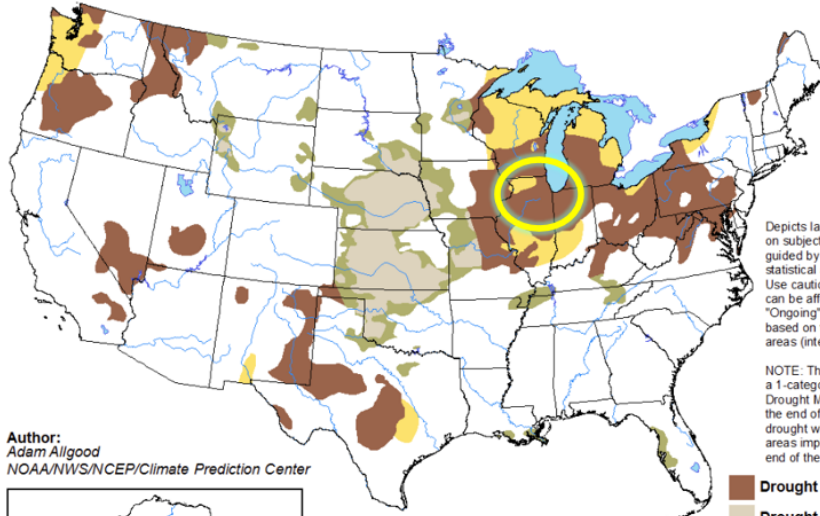

U.S. Seasonal Drought Outlook Drought Tendency During the Valid Period

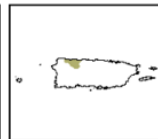
Valid for June 15 - September 30, 2023

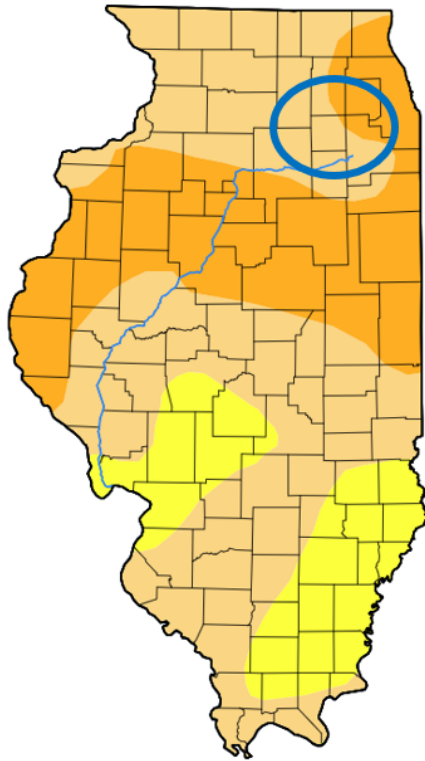

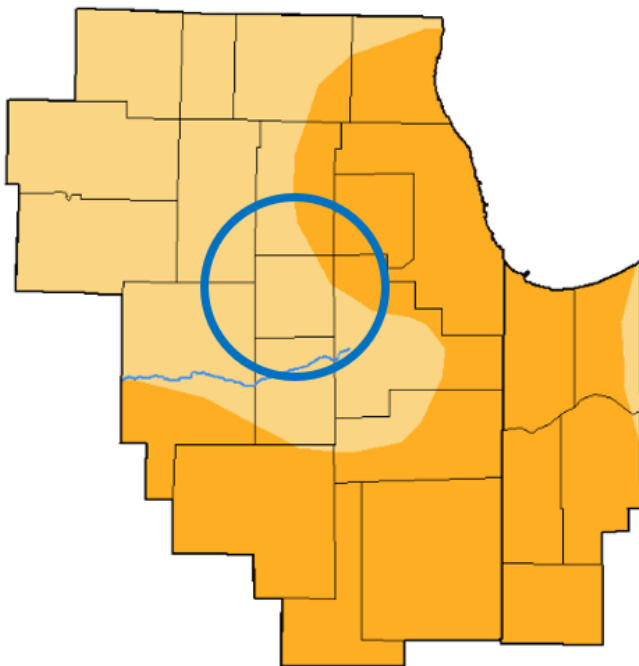

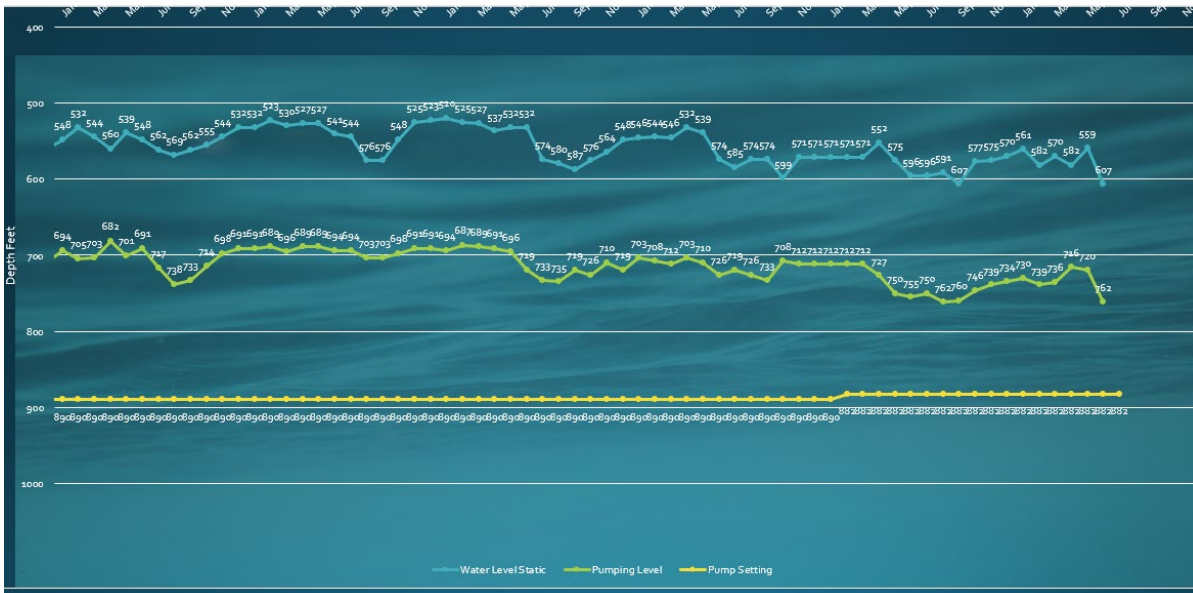

Village Code 8-7-14

(A) Water from the Village of Oswego water distribution system may be used for the watering or sprinkling of gardens, lawns, shrubs or other outdoor plants or for filling swimming pools, only as follows:

1. All properties with **even numbered** street numbers (i.e., numbers ending in 0, 2, 4, 6 or 8) may use village distributed water for sprinkling or automatic water systems for plant or yard watering only on **even numbered calendar dates** between the hours of **4:00 a.m. and 9:00 a.m.**, and between the hours of **6:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m.**
2. All properties with **odd numbered** street numbers (i.e., numbers ending in 1, 3, 5, 7 or 9) may use village distributed water for sprinkling or automatic water systems for plant or yard watering only on **odd numbered calendar dates** between the hours of **4:00 a.m. and 9:00 a.m.** and between the hours of **6:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m.**
3. The use of village distributed water for sprinkling or automatic water systems is **prohibited on the 31st of each month** in which the date occurs.
4. All **non-addressed properties** including, but not limited to, subdivision entrances, roadway islands, and parkways may use village distributed water for sprinkling or automatic water systems for plant or yard watering on **Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays** between the hours of 4:00 a.m. and 9:00 a.m. and between the hours of 6:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m.
5. New or replacement sprinkler systems shall be equipped with a WaterSense labeled irrigation controller and shall be in compliance with section 2.5(g) of the Illinois Plumbing License Law [225 ILCS 320].

(B) Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (A) of this section, the following regulations shall apply:

1. There shall be no restrictions as to hours or days when water from the village water distribution system may be used for:

- (a) Watering or sprinkling of gardens, trees, shrubs or other outdoor plants where such watering or sprinkling is done by a **person using a self-closing handheld watering device;**
- (b) Filling swimming pools with a volume of 50 gallons or less.

~~2. Property owners or residents who want to continuously water a newly seeded, slit seeded, or sodded area less than three months old and more than ten square yards shall obtain a permit for same at the Village of Oswego public works department prior to water usage.~~

~~3. During the first ten days after new sod or seed has been placed, and following the issuance of a permit, property owners may use water from the village water distribution system for the watering or sprinkling of the newly seeded, slit seeded, or sodded yard as follows:~~

~~(a) On the first day that seed/sod is placed, the property owner may water the seed/sod for any eight hours;~~

~~(b) For the next nine days after the seed/sod has been placed, the property owner may water the seed/sod every day between the hours of 12:00 midnight and 9:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. and 12:00 midnight, prevailing time.~~

~~(c) Following the first ten days after the seed/sod has been placed, the provisions of subsection (A) of this section shall apply.~~

~~4. Sod laying, lawn seeding, and the planting of other landscaping for the establishment of a new lawn or new landscaping is **prohibited from July 1 through August 31** each year, unless the source of watering for said sod, lawn seeding, or planting of landscaping is derived from reclaimed ground water, recycled effluent, or harvested rainwater. The prohibition shall not apply to soil erosion and sedimentation plans required pursuant to city ordinances (with approved plans) or for restorations due to required repairs of public utilities (e.g., water main break).~~

(C) Whenever the water supply of the village is diminished, from any cause whatsoever, to an amount which in the opinion of the village president or the village administrator, in consultation with the public works director is or is likely to become dangerous to the health and safety of the public, the village president or village administrator is hereby authorized and empowered to issue a proclamation in the form of a public notice containing regulations on the use of water from the village water distribution system. Such regulations may provide for the limited usage of water, limitations on days and hours of use from some or all purposes, and the prohibition of specified uses. Upon issuing said proclamation, the village president or village administrator shall make the contents thereof known to the public by news release to the local newspapers and radio media, and may also notify the citizens in any other practical manner that shall be devised. Further, the village president or village administrator shall immediately notify all members of the village board of the nature of the emergency and the regulations that have been imposed.

Dear homeowner / resident,

This is a curtesy notice you are in violation of the Village of Oswego's Water Conservation Ordinance. Due to the current drought conditions, outdoor water usage is placing extraordinary demand on the Village's waters supply system. Therefore, the Village and its residents must take action to curtail the use of outdoor water use, or it may risk endangering the public health, safety and welfare.

Water from the Village of Oswego water distribution system may be used for the watering or sprinkling of gardens, lawns, shrubs or other outdoor plants or for filling swimming pools only as follows:

- Odd numbered street addresses (ending in 1, 3, 5, 7 or 9) may sprinkle only on odd-numbered calendar days.
- Even numbered street addresses may sprinkle (ending in 2, 4, 6, 8, or 0) may sprinkle only on even-numbered calendar days.
- The use of village distributed water for sprinkling or automatic water systems is prohibited on the 31st of each month in which the date occurs.
- Sprinkling is only permitted between the hours of 4 a.m. and 9 a.m. and 6 p.m. and 9 p.m. Sprinkling outside of these hours is prohibited.

Any future violation of the ordinance may result in a ticket, fine and court appearance.
