KEY INFRASTRUCTURE UPDATES

NEW WATER SOURCE

The Village's goal to connect to Lake Michigan water through the DuPage Water Commission (DWC) is on track for 2027. Federal grants, low-interest loans and revenue from the voter approved Village's real estate transfer tax will help reduce the total cost of the project. The estimated cost projection is \$73 million; however the Village is working to find cost efficiencies as the engineering studies are completed in 2024-2025.

The Village Board is expected to pass an ordinance at its November 7 meeting to establish a new water rate structure that will begin in January 2024 and appear in March 2024 utility bills. The Village conducted a comprehensive rate study over the past several months and the Board is expected to select the scenario with the least impact to seniors and residents. Water rates were initially expected to more than double, however; the study has found ways the Village can offset project costs and rates are only expected to increase by approximately 4.5% to 6% each year, over the next 8 years. The Village will review the costs on an annual basis to ensure the rates are adjusted accordingly. The proposed rates are in line with rates paid by other communities that receive Lake Michigan water.

A water source open house will be scheduled in January at Village Hall to discuss the conversion to Lake Michigan water and answer questions about our water system. The new water rate structure will also be explained. Stay tuned for the January date and time. Information will be shared in email bulletins, social media and at oswegoil.org/water.

WOLFS CROSSING

Work is being finalized on the first segment of the Village's Wolfs Crossing road improvement project. To improve safety and ease traffic congestion, Wolfs Crossing is being widened to a four-lane road and a roundabout is being constructed at Harvey Road. Our contractors are working hard to open the road as soon as possible. The Village expects the work to be completed by the end of November. However, due to delays caused by ComEd relocating their utility lines, there is a possibility that the road may not reopen until early December. Landscaping, restoration and the final pavement surface course will be completed in the spring.

VAN BUREN IMPROVEMENTS

The Village completed a project in October that replaced existing water main on sections of Wilson, Adams and Van Buren streets in the downtown area. The new water main will increase flow to fire hydrants and ensure adequate water pressure to residents and businesses in the area.

The project also allowed for the construction of new curbs and sidewalks, as well as resurfacing streets. Approximately 60 new public parking spots were also added to access downtown businesses more easily.

To further enhance and encourage new businesses in the downtown area, the Village recently purchased the properties at 6 and 12 W. Van Buren. Since the properties are zoned commercial, the Village will be pursuing options for commercial development including restaurant, retail, office and other similar uses consistent with development in downtown Oswego. The goal is to make downtown Oswego even more of a destination for residents and visitors.

ROAD RESURFACING

The Board allocated \$2.9 million to resurface some of the Village's most worn streets. Approximately 8 lane-miles of roadways were completed during the 2023 construction season. Streets like Mill Road that see higher traffic volumes were prioritized based on overall condition, level of traffic and other operational considerations.

PUBLIC WORKS

WASTE COLLECTION

FREE DECEMBER YARD WASTE COLLECTION

During the week of December 4 on your waste collection day, put out yard waste bags without stickers. All yard waste must be placed in 30-gallon Kraft yard waste bags. Yard waste will not be accepted if it is placed by the curb or in plastic bags.

HOLIDAY SCHEDULE

In observance of Christmas Day, December 25 and January 1 for New Year's Day, waste will not be collected. Trash and recycling collection following these holidays will be delayed by one day.

CHRISTMAS TREE DISPOSAL

Groot will collect Christmas trees after the holidays through January 13. Place your bare tree, free from lights, ornaments, tinsel, or any decorations by the curb on your normal scheduled garbage day. Do not bag your tree or affix a yard waste sticker.

After January 13, you must wait until April for disposal when the yard waste program resumes, and a sticker will be required.

HELP OUR PLOWS CLEAR YOUR STREETS

THE VILLAGE'S PUBLIC WORKS SNOWPLOW CREWS work hard to keep you safe during the winter driving season. Pitch in to keep the streets clear and save yourself headaches by taking these steps around your home:

- Clear the area around your mailbox. This helps prevent damage to your mailbox and the hassle of getting a replacement.
- Remove snow from the parkways on either side of your driveway apron. This lets our plows unload their snow before crossing your driveway, so extra slush doesn't block in your cars.
- Pile your driveway snow in your yard. Remember, shoveling or blowing snow into the street is prohibited by Village ordinance.

Plowing crews prioritize collector roads such as Douglas Road and Boulder Hill Pass since the roads provide access to large areas. Crews then address neighborhood streets. The Village uses a private contractor to plow cul-de-sacs which are very labor intensive. The State plows U.S. Routes 30 and 34, plus IL Routes 71 and 25. Kendall County plows Orchard Road.

Visibility from snowplows is limited for both pedestrians and drivers. Keep a safe driving distance away from plows and remind children to stay away from plows when they're on your street.



FROM THE POLICE DEPARTMENT

NEW POLICE CHIEF

Village President Ryan Kauffman, with unanimous board approval, appointed Jason Bastin to serve as the Village's Police Chief at the September 19 Board Meeting. Chief Bastin had served as interim chief since former Police Chief Jeff Burgner's retirement on June 13. The Village employed a rigorous recruitment process that involved community stakeholder meetings, surveys, interviews and a full-day assessment process led by the Illinois Association of Chiefs.

Chief Bastin has served the Oswego Police Department for 18 years in a variety of positions including deputy chief of support services, patrol commander, detective sergeant and school resource officer. In his career he has taken on many additional roles including Kendall County Special Response Team leader, firearms instructor, field training officer and rapid deployment instructor.



Chief Bastin completed leadership courses led by the FBI, Northwestern University's School of Staff and Command and received a B.A. from Benedictine University. Bastin served as a field medic for the Marines prior to beginning his career in law enforcement.

He pledges to continue building and maintaining positive community relationships since the Police Department's ability to serve our residents and businesses well is dependent on the public's approval and respect.



FULLY STAFFED

In October, Sergeant Drew Santa was promoted to day shift Patrol Commander and Sergeant Mike Barajas was promoted to night shift Patrol Commander. With the recent growth of the department from 49 to 54 officers, the commander positions will allow mentoring and coaching opportunities for our sergeants. The increased leadership will benefit the police department, as well as the public.

A strong culture of leadership reinforces organizational values, drives performance and professionalism, and leads to increased public trust, all of which results in a safer community.

SHOVEL SIDEWALKS, HYDRANTS & DRIVEWAYS



Although plow drivers take care to selectively place snow, sometimes snow must be placed at intersections and heaped on parkways.

Help keep yourself and your neighbors safe by shoveling curb ramps and digging out fire hydrants so they can be accessed quickly in a fire.

When clearing snow, do not deposit snow onto the roads. Shoveling, plowing, or blowing snow into public streets causes driving hazards and is prohibited by Village ordinance. Keep garbage & recycling cans out of the street so plows do not hit them.

SAFE PLACES FOR SALE EXCHANGES

Residents can conduct online sales transactions in one of two locations at the Police Department, 3355 Woolley Road.

There are two designated parking spaces for online sale transactions in the front parking lot, northwest side. This area has 24-hour video surveillance, is well-lit, and is a short distance from the emergency phone at the building's front entrance. In addition the lobby is equipped with cameras and open to the public from 7 a.m. to 11 p.m. daily, except on certain holidays.

These exchange zones provide a neutral, monitored meeting place to conduct face-to-face transactions and provide a deterrent to those who want to take advantage of an unsuspecting victim. However, it is important to exercise good judgment when meeting with strangers. No matter where you conduct sales transactions, keep in mind the following safety tips:

- When possible, arrange to meet in a public and busy place. Avoid going to someone's home or having someone come to your own if at all possible.
- Be alert to someone using counterfeit money or stolen and forged checks.
- Be aware of someone trying to sell you stolen, broken or fake items. Inspect the items, make sure they work and are not counterfeit.
- Avoid carrying large amounts of cash.
- If something is too good to be true, it's probably a scam.

NO PARKING ON SNOW-COVERED STREETS

Parking is prohibited on Village streets when two inches or more of snow has accumulated. Keeping cars off the streets helps Village crews clear the roads faster, prevents your car from being plowed in and helps emergency vehicles access your home. Street parking can resume once the snow stops and the streets have been plowed curb to curb.
