FROM THE VILLAGE PRESIDENT



FALL CONNECTION

Fall has always been my favorite season of the year. Leaves changing colors, bonfires, sweatshirts and cool nights. As we shift into the beautiful autumn season, I have several exciting updates and events to share with you.

Following on the success of The Village Board on Your Block initiative that kicked off with the first meeting at the Southbury Clubhouse in July, our next event is this fall. This program brings

local government directly to your neighborhood, fostering open communication between residents and village officials. Join us between 5 and 7 p.m. on November 6 at the Hunt Club Elementary School for an opportunity to ask questions, discuss community issues and share your thoughts. All are welcome.

In July, the Village Board voted to pay off the \$3 million remaining balance on a bond issued in 2013. The decision to pay the \$3 million balance off early using our surplus funds is a testament to our commitment to financial responsibility, transparency and efficiency. We are always looking for ways to save taxpayer money; by eliminating future interest payments and reallocating \$1 million during this transition year, we can further enhance our community's services and infrastructure.

Speed Watch Program: We know that Oswego is one of the safest communities in the country. In fact, in 2023 Oswego was recognized as the 12th safest community in the country among communities with a population of 25,000 people or more, according to FBI statistics. But one persistent frustration I hear from residents is speeding in neighborhoods. So, we've come up with the Speed Watch Program. The Police Department will loan out a radar gun for short periods to interested residents concerned about speeding. The speed violators' information will be conveyed to the Police Department and a letter (not a speeding ticket, since only Police Officers can write tickets) encouraging them to slow down may be sent to the speeder. Look for more details to come soon.

LAKE MICHIGAN WATER SOURCE

The Village of Oswego is partnering with the Village of Montgomery, the United City of Yorkville and the DuPage Water Commission to bring Lake Michigan water to our community. Studies have shown that without the connection, Oswego's wells could be inoperable within the next 10 years. All three communities have agreed on the pipeline route and the following cost allocation: 35.36% Oswego, 24.42% Montgomery and 40.22% Yorkville.

Engineering has begun and the next steps are to join the DuPage Water Commission and to bid the project for construction. The goal is to start taking Lake Michigan water in 2028. To help offset project costs, the Village has been working to leverage federal and state money, including applying for grants and loans. Learn more: **oswegoil.org/water**.

CORROSION CONTROL STUDY

To ensure a smooth and safe connection to Lake Michigan water, corrosion testing is being performed on pipes from Oswego, Montgomery and Yorkville. The US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and the Illinois EPA require this study when a municipality changes its water source. By conducting this study, the Village will better understand how Lake Michigan water will interact with our existing pipes and identify steps we need to take to protect our residents.



The contractor, Cornwell Engineering Group, has developed a pipe rig with water from the three communities being run through the respective pipes. It will take approximately six months to acclimate the pipes to well water from each town and then Lake Michigan water will be introduced. Oswego has nine pipes on the rig. When the testing has concluded, Cornwell will analyze the results and recommend the best treatment options, as needed, to the municipalities.

WOLFS CROSSING IMPROVEMENTS



A new Wolfs Crossing segment map has been created with a revised order for the multi-year project. See the map key below.

Work continues on the Village's Wolfs Crossing improvement project to create a modern, five-lane road to help ease traffic congestion, improve safety and accommodate current and future growth. The first segment, a roundabout at Wolfs Crossing and Harvey Road, is substantially complete.

Engineering plans are underway for the second segment, including a roundabout, at Wolfs Crossing and Douglas Road. The project will go to bid this winter and construction is expected to begin in spring 2025.

The third segment is located at Wolfs Crossing and the Roth Road/Oswego East High School entrance. The Sonoma Trails developer DR Horton will fund a majority of the construction costs for this segment. The Village has started engineering and property acquisition and anticipates construction starting as early as 2026.


The Village is lobbying elected leaders in Springfield for the state to fund the fourth segment which includes intersection improvements at Wolfs Crossing and US Route 30.

The Village continues to seek federal and state funding to supplement developer contributions and local funding to finish all the remaining segments.

MAP KEY

- 1. Harvey east to Devoe and west to approx. south entrance of Oswego East Hight School (OEHS) and Wolfs Crossing: Roundabout.
- 2. Douglas east to old Douglas, west to Piper Glen and Wolfs Crossing: Roundabout. Estimated November 2024 bid letting.
- 3. Roth Road and Wolfs Crossing: Traffic signals at Wolfs Crossing intersections with Roth Road and OEHS.
- 4. Devoe east to Rt. 30 on Wolfs Crossing: Widening and turn lanes on Wolfs Crossing and Rt. 30, plus traffic signal upgrade.
- 5. Rt. 30 east to Eola Road on Wolfs Crossing: Widening and turn lanes.
- 6. Fifth Street east to Riesling and west to approximately Plank Jr. High and Wolfs Crossing: Roundabout.
- 7. Connect east of Douglas roundabout to approximately Plank Jr. High: No major intersection.
- 8. Southbury and Wolfs Crossing: Roundabout.
- 9. Rt. 34 east to past Stonehill on Wolfs Crossing: 3-lane intersection, improvement with center lane.
- 10. Stonehill east to Della Lane on Wolfs Crossing: Widen to 3 lanes.



PUBLIC WORKS

FREE CURBSIDE LEAF COLLECTION



Each fall, the curbside leaf vacuum program provides Oswego residents with a cost-effective way to dispose of leaves.

To prepare for collection, rake leaves into piles and place them on the parkway grass between the sidewalk and curb by 6 a.m. on the Monday of your collection week. Village crews will collect leaves three times this season.

No brush, grass clippings, tree limbs, vines or trash will be collected. These materials can cause damage to the Village's costly equipment and put staff and residents in the area at risk of injury or death.

Note: Burning leaves is prohibited.

LEAF COLLECTION SCHEDULE:

Zone A Weeks of October 14 and October 28

Zone B Weeks of October 14 and November 4

Zone C Weeks of October 21 and November 11

All Zones Week of November 18.

Leaf collection dates are subject to change based on weather, leaf volume and collection rates.

HYDRANT FLUSHING

The Public Works Department will flush water mains between Tuesday, September 3 and Monday, September 30 (weather permitting). Public Works staff will begin flushing at 7:30 a.m. Signs will be placed to alert residents of upcoming hydrant flushing in their area. During flushing it's best to complete laundry before 7 a.m. or after 6 p.m. to avoid potential rust discoloration of laundry.

The Village flushes fire hydrants in the spring and fall per the Illinois EPA's recommendation. Flushing cleans water mains by running high flows of water through fire hydrants to remove mineral deposits that could produce discolored water and, in some instances, damage water meters. Flushing also helps deliver fresh water to dead end water mains.



FALL BRUSH COLLECTION

Final brush collection dates:

Zone A: Week of September 30

Zone B: Week of October 7

FREE FALL CLEANUP

The week of November 11, items such as household waste, yard waste and bulk items will be collected for free by Groot. Place all items, along with your regular garbage and recycling, at the curb by 6 a.m. on your scheduled garbage day. Yard waste must be placed in 30-gallon Kraft yard waste bags. Stickers will not be required this week only. To dispose of appliances, televisions or other electronics, schedule a special pickup from Groot at 630-892-9294.

YARD WASTE COLLECTION

The last regular yard waste collection will take place the week of November 11. However, there will be a free yard waste collection the week of December 2. For this pickup only, stickers will not be required.

NO WASTE COLLECTION

Residential waste and recycling will not be picked up on Labor Day, September 2, and Thursday, November 28 in observance of Thanksgiving. Trash and recycling collection will be delayed by one day during these weeks. For information, visit **oswegoil.org/waste** or call Public Works at (630) 554-3242.




Hennessy's River View Ford, July Business of the Month

SCHOOL BUS

SCHOOL BUSES

When driving behind a school bus, allow a greater following distance than driving behind a car. This allows more time to stop once its yellow lights start flashing.

•Never pass a bus from behind or from either direction on a two-lane highway if it is stopped to load or unload children. On a four-lane roadway, if there are at least two lanes of traffic in each direction, only drivers traveling in the same direction as the school bus are required to stop. The same rule applies for spots with

a divided highway and a median.

•If the yellow or red lights are flashing and the stop arm is extended, traffic must stop.

•The area 10 feet around a school bus is the most dangerous for children. Stop far enough back to allow space to safely enter and exit the bus.

•Be alert: Children often are unpredictable, and they tend to ignore hazards and take risks.

BACK-TO-SCHOOL SAFETY

The Oswego Police Department and the Traffic Safety Unit are committed to keeping all children and pedestrians safe.

With the new school year:

- •Do not park in posted "no parking" areas.
- •Do not double park.
- •Do not stop or otherwise block the streets around your child's school.
- •Do not block the driveways of area homes.

Motorists are reminded that the **speed limit in all school zones is 20 MPH** when children are present. Penalties are enhanced for speeding violations in school zones.

Police will conduct extra enforcement details in all area school zones, especially for the first several weeks at the start of the school year.




DANGERS OF SPEEDING

Traffic fatalities in northeastern Illinois have been increasing since 2014, with a significant spike during the COVID-19 pandemic with higher levels of pedestrian and bicyclist fatalities. Speeding has been identified as a contributing factor in approximately 35-40% of fatal crashes in Illinois.

When we think of the dangers of speeding, a large highway with many fast-moving vehicles may come to mind. However, studies show that fatal and serious injury crashes are most prevalent on lower-speed urban roads.

These roads may have frequent intersections, often with neighborhood, business and school access points. You can find people walking, biking and accessing transit. These vulnerable travelers are at higher risk of severe injury and death if struck by a vehicle.



Speeding can also limit one's perception of their surroundings, which can lessen one's reaction time and result in a crash, often with severe injuries.

What can you do? Slow down to keep all road users safe. The Oswego Police Department is committed to reinforcing safe driving behavior with education and equitable enforcement.

Safer streets also start with you. We encourage you to understand the risks of speeding, slow down, share the road, and pass these messages along to your friends, family and loved ones.
